



MEET CUMMINS MEMORIAL THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY ALUMNI: REVEREND FRED GARNETT



The Reverend Fred Garnett

In the early 1970's, Fred Garnett returned to his hometown of Moncks Corner, South Carolina after living in Boston, Massachusetts. Upon his return and pursuing his love of music, he opened a record shop on Main Street in Moncks Corner. No matter how good the disco life was, Fred faithfully attended his home church, Bethlehem R.E. Church.

One Sunday, the then president of the Sunday School Convention was visiting Fred's church and asked him to be the Lower Berkeley Chairperson. Fred said No! However, the president returned the following week with the same ask and this time, Fred agreed to serve as a chairperson. He began to study the Sunday School lessons to be prepared as he visited the different churches. What became obvious was that there were teachers teaching who did not (as Rev. Garnett puts it), "...know John the Baptist from John the disciple." He thought that if he was going to be apart of this church and leadership, he was going to know what he was talking about. This experience opened the door for him to go to seminary and begin his ministry.

While in seminary, he served as the Sunday School Convention President, Men of the Church President and he was asked to serve as a student minister to Atonement R.E. Church. He served there for two years.

Following Atonement, he was called to Holy Trinity R.E. Church and served there for eight years. The church grew and Rev. Garnett undertook several projects to uplift the church building. He was then called to Good Shepherd R. E. Church and served there for nearly three years. While there, Rev. Garnett was instrumental in leading the church's building of its current fellowship hall.

MEET CUMMINS MEMORIAL THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY ALUMNI: REVEREND FRED GARNETT CONTINUED...

After serving Good Shepherd, Rev. Garnett was called to be the pastor of Grace R.E. Church. He served Grace for 15 years and officially retired as a pastor. While at Grace, Rev. Garnett was an advocate for youth ministry and used his creativity to birth many youth focused initiatives such as the youth talent shows, Joy Night and the many youth fun and educational trips.

In his retirement, Rev. Garnett is still very active in ministry. He was assigned as supply pastor for Redeemer R.E. Church for two Sundays and it turned into three years. Just like Redeemer, he followed the same pattern and was scheduled to serve Holy Comforter R. E. Church for two Sundays and it turned into nearly four years. Rev. Garnett continues to serve as a supply pastor in the Diocese of the Southeast. One year, he served this diocese as a member of the Board of Trustees and Foreign Missions Board.



During all of this, Rev. Garnett has also served as the President of the Berkeley County Ministerial Alliance. This interdenominational organization has and continues to provide vital resources to vulnerable populations in the county. Rev. Garnett has conducted prison ministry, community advocacy and crisis assistance as part of his service with this organization.

Without doubt, Rev. Garnett's ministry is one that inspires us all and serves as an example of what is possible when you keep God first in all things. His wife, friend and biggest supporter throughout his life and ministry, Mrs. Linda Garnett, shines right along with him in this moment... *To God be the Glory!!*

> The Awards Dinner was Friday, April 14, 2023, at JaLiOnna Event Venue, in Moncks Corner. SC.

On the heels of the Black Lives Matter Movement, many persons, communities, and faith-based organizations sought ways to impact their communities positively. South Carolina Lowcountry residences were no exception. After several conversations and meetings, it became evident that specific training was needed to assist communities in accomplishing targeted goals.

The Certificate of Community Service Program was the brainchild of Dr. Rose D. Gibbs. The aim is to train and equip rural women as community facilitators and project managers. Given the family, cultural, historical, and community dynamics, women were the best candidates for this program. The program aimed to train and equip women with the skills needed to develop and sustain specific activities in their rural communities.

Dr. Gibbs and Martha P. Dixon worked together to write the proposal. The proposal outlined the phases of the program, the seminars within each phase, and a budget. In May 2021, Cummins Memorial Theological Seminary (CMTS) applied for a grant from the Spaulding-Paolozzi Foundation. The aim was to train and equip rural women as community facilitators and project managers. During the summer of 2021, we learned that the project was funded. Dr. Julius Barnes allowed the project to be housed at CMTS.

Berkeley County was the targeted area for the project, and we attempted to find interested people throughout the county to complete the application process. Zoom meetings were held on Monday nights for seminars and discussions. Each participant completed a community needs assessment to determine what the community needed. Some participants decided to enhance already established projects; others would create new ones. The training involved public speaking, conducting community needs assessment surveys, writing the needs assessment reports, developing mission and vision statements, creating budgets, creating a timeline, implementing projects, securing funding sources, and evangelism and cross-cultural training, to name a few.

The Prince Center Food Distribution Cordesville. SC

The center provides services to improve, uplift, inform, and educate the community. Conducting food giveaways at least once every six weeks is one way to help the surrounding communities.

GENEVA L. FLEMING

Prospectives on Education: Conversations with Black Educators in Berkeley County Moncks Corner, SC

This documentary recognizes the value of education in the Black communities of Berkeley County, highlighting lessons learned from the past while acknowledging current issues and opportunities for future success.

REV. GEORGE C. MCCRAY

The Pineville/Eadytown Community Park Pineville, SC

This project cleaned the park and prepared it for the three-day Labor Day Weekend Event in 2022. In March, the community's men installed lights in the shelter/pavilion.

PPW Cooperative Community Garden Moncks Corner, SC

The garden provided opportunities for positive social interaction while obtaining fresh fruits and vegetables for the community to enhance their health.

MICHELLE B. TAYLOR


God's Gifted Girls (3 G's)
