## Dr. Charles Echols CMTS Professor



Charles L. Echols, BA, MDiv, MLitt, PhD (Cambridge), is an ordained priest in the Anglican Diocese of South Carolina, and is currently serving as Associate Rector at St. Matthews Church, Ft. Motte, SC. After completing his doctorate, he moved with his wife and daughter to Pune, India, where he taught Old Testament and supervised theses at the bachelor's and master's level. Since returning to the U.S. in 2013, he has taught as an adjunct at Claflin University, South University, and Cummins

Memorial Theological Seminary. Dr. Echols has published one peer-reviewed volume, "Tell Me, O Muse": The Song of Deborah (Judges 5) in the Light of Heroic Poetry (LHBOTS 487; New York: T&T Clark International, 2008), two open-access books, Reading Ruth: A Guide to the Hebrew Text (2010), and Reading Jonah: A Guide to the Hebrew Text (2013), peer-reviewed essays including "Can the Samson Narrative Properly Be Called Heroic?," pages 63-76, in Leshon Limmudim: Essays on the Language and Literature of the Hebrew Bible in Honour of A. A. Macintosh (eds. David A. Baer and Robert P. Gordon; LHBOTS 593; New York: Bloomsbury T&T Clark, 2013), and "The Tree of Life in Ancient Near Eastern Literature," in The Tree of Life (ed. Douglas Estes; Themes in Biblical Narrative; Leiden: Brill, 2020). His peer-reviewed articles include "The Contribution of Heroic Poetry to the Identification of a New Genre in the Hebrew Bible," Union Biblical Seminary Journal 7.2-8.1 (2013), 95-126 and "Palace," in Lexham Bible Dictionary (eds. John D. Barry, et al.; Bellingham, WA: Lexham Press, 2015). Dr. Echols particularly enjoys helping students learn how to conduct exegesis independently and present the Old Testament afresh through lifechanging teaching and sermons.
